

Ligeti Quartet



The Ligeti Quartet has been at the forefront of modern and contemporary music since its formation in 2010, breaking new ground through innovative programming and championing of today's most exciting composers and artists.

The ensemble has been making waves between classical, contemporary, and electronic music worldwide in countries such as the UK, Canada, United States, China, Germany, Denmark, and France.

Highlights for the 2025-6 season include a feature concert at the Rainy Days Festival at the Philharmonie in Luxembourg and a world premiere of a new work by London-based composer Blasio Kavuma at the Barbican. They will tour to The Hague performing Ligeti, and Nuc, with music from their critically acclaimed album with Anna Meredith. In October 2026 they will be part of the Steve Reich 90th birthday celebrations at the newly opened Schwarzman Centre in Oxford.

Having played at landmark venues around the world including Carnegie Hall, Curtis Institute, Wigmore Hall, Purcell Room, Barbican Hall, and Kings Place, the quartet also enjoy performing in more unusual places, previous venues including museums, galleries, theatres, pubs, planetariums, a fishing boat, and a cave. They have commissioned many new works and have collaborated with artists from all types of musical backgrounds including Anna Meredith, Xenia Pestova, Elliot Galvin, Kerry Andrew, Laura Jurd, Meilyr Jones, Neil Hannon, Seb Rochford, Shabaka Hutchings, Sean Noonan, Shed 7 and Submotion Orchestra.

The quartet's most recent album 'Nuc' (2023, Mercury KX) is a celebration of Anna Meredith's music for string quartet, including arrangements by the quartet's viola player Richard Jones. "An album that continually surprises and enlightens" (BBC Music). Their tour of the album in 2023 was supported by Music In The Round and Arts Council England. Their previous album Songbooks Vol. 1 (2020, Nonclassical), part of a long-standing collaboration with award-winning composer Christian Mason, explores the way in which the acoustic properties of the string quartet emulate the human voice through Mason's use of extended techniques and unique sound-worlds. "Magnificently vivid performances... sheer unadulterated exuberance" (Gramophone).



The quartet named themselves after the Hungarian composer György Ligeti (1923-2006), inspired by his kaleidoscopic musical outlook and tireless invention. 2023 included many concerts celebrating the 100th anniversary of his birth. They curated the "Ligeti Day" at Aldeburgh Festival (23 June 2023) during which they performed two concerts of György Ligeti's music and the world premieres of 15 new commissions including Entasis by Lukas Ligeti (supported by Britten Pears Arts, BBC Radio 3, the Vaughan Williams Foundation, and Bourgie Hall).

The critically acclaimed Ligeti Quartet perform tracks from their 2023 album *Nuc* fusing **acoustic and electronic music for string quartet** by the Mercury-prize nominated composer **Anna Meredith**.

The result is a joyful, occasionally furious, never too serious, energetic yet restful collection of tracks which dazzle with Anna's signature compulsive harmonies, rhythmic shifts of gear and sparkling textures.

Bespoke projections are by animator Ewan Morris Jones, along with a **video** for 'Tuggemo' featuring a melee of plant, animal and mineral creations which swarm together as the song swells.

Created using a combination of 2D animation and AI techniques, the visual is a compelling, colourful and hypnotic evolution story.

Nuc is performed **amplified** with a full **electronic backing track**. The disc was one of The Guardian's Top 10 Contemporary Albums of 2023.



Programme length: one hour, or two x 45 mins with added repertoire such as Ligeti String Quartets, Reich 'Different Trains', George Crumb 'Black Angels'.



Different Trains

The Ligeti Quartet celebrate legend **Steve Reich's 90th Birthday** with a special celebratory programme, featuring his best-loved *Different Trains* (presented with optional d&b Soundscape surround sound). They also perform a brand new arrangement of Riley's *Poppy Nogood and the Phantom Band* - a cornerstone recording of the late 60s psychedelic era - for amplified string quartet and d&b Soundscape, alongside accompanying works. In Justè Janulytè's original 2018 work for four string quartets, the groups are placed around the audience, forming a square, whilst the music moves in circular patterns. In this new version, the Ligeti Quartet perform amplified with three pre-recorded layers played back in quadraphonic speaker formation.

Into the Night

Join the Ligeti Quartet for their new programme, "Into the Night," built around Dutilleux's 1976 composition "Ainsi la Nuit".

Opening with Nørgård's String Quartet No. 8, "Night Descending Like Smoke," written in 2015, this piece captures the mysterious and ethereal qualities of nightfall. Bartók's "Adagio Molto," a profound exploration of night music, sets a contemplative mood, while Saariaho's "Terra Memoria" pays a poignant tribute to memory and loss.

The programme culminates with Dutilleux's "Ainsi la Nuit," a masterful work renowned for its complex and luminous depiction of the night. Dutilleux's compositional style is marked by its meticulous craftsmanship, rich harmonic textures, and innovative use of timbre and form, creating a sound world that is both intricate and evocative.

As ever the Quartet champion today's music with a new commission, soon to be announced, also appearing in this programme. Experience the Ligeti Quartet as they navigate through the depths and nuances of nocturnal soundscapes.

Brilliant trumpet meets boundary-pushing strings. Works by Maxwell Davies, Meredith, Nyman, and Milenko, plus a brand-new commission. Expect pulse, power, and poetic sound worlds – a bold celebration of contemporary music at its most thrilling.

This programme showcases the trumpet's extraordinary versatility in dialogue with the string quartet. Maxwell Davies' *Trumpet Quintet* combines austere modernism with moments of haunting beauty, while Anna Meredith's *Solstice In, Solstice Out* fuses acoustic and electronic sensibilities into a vivid rhythmic tapestry. Michael Nyman's *Trumpet Quintet* brings the composer's characteristic pulse and clarity to chamber forces, and Kirsten Milenko's *Duets* (for trumpet quintet) draws listeners into an intricate interplay of breath, tone and texture. The evening concludes with a newly commissioned work, expanding the repertoire and reaffirming the Ligeti Quartet's commitment to contemporary innovation.

Poppy Nogood

2025 was the 90th Birthday year of Terry Riley, a composer whose catalogue of work continues to influence widely diverse musicians and musical approaches. To celebrate and acknowledge this great composer, the Ligeti Quartet present a brand new arrangement of *Poppy Nogood* - a cornerstone recording of the late 60s psychedelic era - for amplified string quartet and dnb Soundscape, alongside accompanying works.

The quartet have been given exclusive permission from Riley to re-arrange this iconic piece.

The Ligeti Quartet celebrate Riley's contribution to the string quartet canon with a performance of a seminal work, *Cadenza on the Night Plain*, which emerged from his early collaborations with the Kronos Quartet in the 1980s. This partnership became essential to their respective developments and in this piece you can hear the free-wheeling Terry Riley, of extended keyboard improvisations, getting to grips with a form loaded with musical backstory.

Alongside these, they will perform *70 chords for Terry* by Pauline Oliveros, a close contemporary of Riley's, whose approach to listening and improvisation reveals radical new ways of communal music-making.

Nouvelles Études

Nouvelles Études (New Studies) is a collection of 14 works by 14 composers for string quartet, each inspired by one of György Ligeti's Études for piano. They were all performed for the first time at the Aldeburgh Festival 2023 to celebrate the centenary of Ligeti's birth.

Now, the Ligeti Quartet are looking to commission and premiere four remaining composers to complete the set of 18 études.

György Ligeti: (b. 1923) *String Quartets No. 1 & 2*

John Adams @ 80

To mark the 80th birthday of John Adams, the Ligeti Quartet presents a programme exploring the breadth of his writing for string quartet.

The programme opens with four movements from John's Book of Alleged Dances: Judah to Ocean, Pavane: She's So Fine, Habanera and Ständchen: The Little Serenade. Written for the Kronos Quartet, these miniature character pieces reveal Adams at his most lyrical, playful and unexpectedly tender. Adams described them as "alleged" dances because "the steps for them had yet to be invented", and the music often seems to hover between the familiar and the fantastical.

The first half concludes with Caroline Shaw's Ritornello 2.sq.2.j.a., a 17-minute work inspired by the Baroque ritornello form, in which musical material repeatedly returns in altered guise. Drawing on the instrumental ritornellos of Claudio Monteverdi's L'Orfeo, Shaw allows fragments of music to reappear, dissolve and mutate using the full scope of the instruments to create constantly evolving textures.

The programme culminates in Adams's First String Quartet, written in 2008. Restless, dramatic and fiercely virtuosic, it draws together many strands of his musical language: propulsive rhythmic energy, lyricism and a constant sense of motion and transformation. Intense and exhilarating, it is one of Adams's most compelling chamber works and a fitting centrepiece to this celebration of his music at 80.

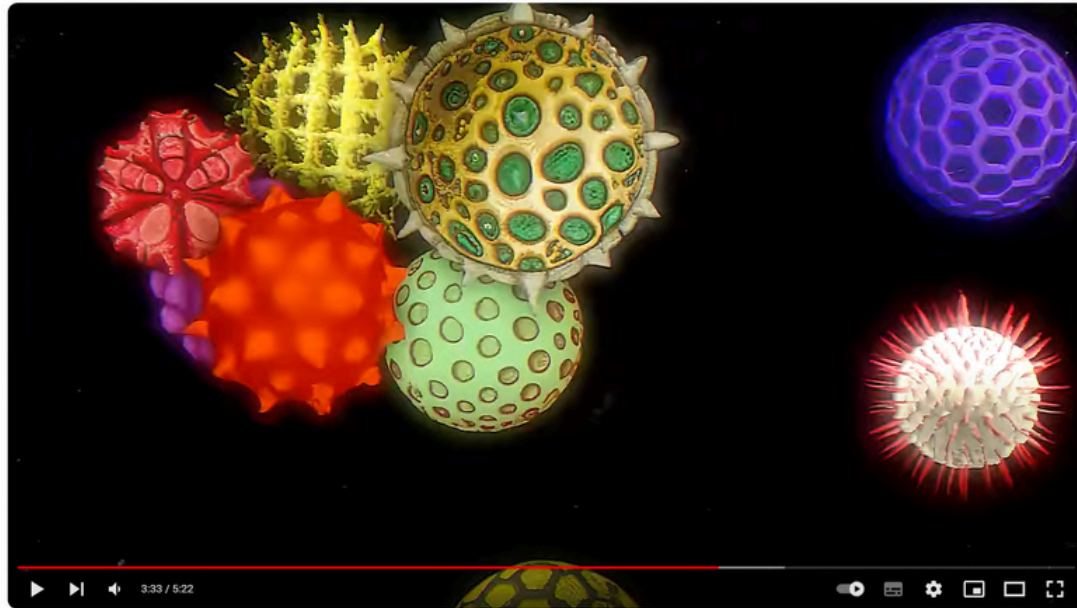
